Bloomberg L.P. (“Bloomberg”) is sponsoring and hosting the Data for Good Exchange Conference (the “Conference”) at its New York headquarters on September 28, 2015. The Conference will further Bloomberg’s tradition of advocating for using data science and human capital to solve problems at the core of society.

There will be no charge to attend the Conference. In connection with the Conference, Bloomberg is soliciting the submission of academic papers related to data science in the fields of government innovation, the environment, public health, and education. Bloomberg plans to submit these papers for peer review by a panel of independent experts in these fields, and then self-publish accepted papers and make them available in an unrestricted manner on the company website and on <screeendoor.com>.

The Authors will retain their copyrights in their papers. However, the <screeendoor.com> publication will be pursuant to the Creative Commons CC BY License, which will permit users, at no charge, to access, review and download the papers, without any registration or barriers to access, and to reproduce, distribute, publicly display and create derivative works from these papers in any format or medium, provided only that the user gives the authors proper attribution and does not sell or commercially license the papers.

Each published papers will be tagged with a digital object identifier (“DOI”), to identify the paper as a unique document over its lifetime. In addition to their publication on Bloomberg’s website, the papers will also be archived to ensure their availability.

It is Bloomberg’s intent to avoid conflicts of interest in its participation in the conference and publishing of Conference papers. For this reason, Bloomberg will take steps to prevent experts on our peer-review panel from reviewing papers in which they have any direct or direct personal interest. Bloomberg thus will require those submitting papers for publication to divulge any familial, contractual, fiduciary or financial relations to Bloomberg or its officers, directors, employees, agents or representatives, or any of the Conference reviewers, and will require the experts on our peer-review panel to disclose any such connection with those submitting papers. We will then take steps to avoid any potential conflicts of interest, or even an appearance of impropriety, by arranging for papers to be reviewed by unrelated and independent reviewers.
